

THE STATE OF GUN VIOLENCE IN VERMONT

Vermont made significant improvements to its gun laws in 2018, yet the state could do far more to save lives from gun violence. Legislators must step up and take proactive measures to address this public safety crisis.

GUN SUICIDE

- Nearly 88% of gun deaths in Vermont are suicides, and more than 54% of all suicide deaths in Vermont involve firearms.
- From 2008 to 2017, 597 people in Vermont died by gun-related suicide.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

- Guns make domestic violence incidents far more likely to end in death.
- 75% of Vermont's intimate partner homicides involve a gun.

TRAFFICKING

- Because of the state's weak gun laws, guns are purchased in Vermont and trafficked to states with stronger gun laws, where they end up in the hands of criminals and people unable to pass a background check.
- From 2013 to 2017, 846 guns originally purchased in Vermont were recovered after being used in crime in other states.

YOUNG PEOPLE AND GUNS

- Exposure to gun violence can cause lasting trauma in young people, leading to PTSD, chronic stress, and decreased future earnings.
- From 2008 to 2017, 83 people under age 25 were killed with a gun in Vermont.

PROVEN SOLUTIONS TO PREVENT GUN VIOLENCE IN VERMONT

Vermont comprehensively strengthened its gun laws in 2018 by passing universal background checks and extreme risk protection legislation, raising the minimum age to purchase firearms, banning sales of large-capacity magazines, and authorizing law enforcement to remove firearms in certain domestic violence incidents. Vermont should build on this progress by **strengthening prohibitions on gun access by domestic abusers, adopting waiting periods, and enacting laws to combat gun trafficking.**
